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B. Citizen Participation and Public Comment

1. Briefly describe how the grantee followed its citizen participation plan regarding this proposed substantial amendment (limit 250 words).

Response: Anne Arundel County followed its citizen participation plan as outlined in the Anne Arundel County Consolidate Plan FY 2006-FY 2010. According to the Consolidated Plan, the public process for a substantial amendment to the Annual Action Plan involves complying with the following public process:

1. Notification of the amendment is published in The Annapolis Capital and The Maryland Gazette newspapers. This notification will be provided with a 30-day comment period. All comments received in writing, or presented orally, will be considered and incorporated within the Annual Action Plan amendment when deemed appropriate.
2. The Annual Action Plan amendments are submitted to HUD with a summary of all comments, with explanations provided for those comments that were not incorporated into the amendment.
3. Any substantial amendment to the Annual Action Plan submitted to HUD will be available at the office of ACDS and available for review on our website at www.acdsinc.org. A reasonable number of copies will be made available free of charge at the request of citizens or community groups.

With the exception of reducing the comment period from 30 days to 12 days as allowed by HUD guidance, Anne Arundel County followed its citizen participation plan for amending its Annual Action Plan. A public notice was published in the Annapolis Capital and the Maryland Gazette newspapers on May 2, 2009 and comments were accepted through May 13, 2009. The notice and amendment was made available on the ACDS website. Additionally, copies of the amendment were provided to members of the Anne Arundel County Partnership to End Homelessness (the County's Continuum of Care Planning Group). The amendment will be submitted to HUD for its review on May 18, 2009.

Response: ACDS, on behalf of Anne Arundel County, did not receive any written public comments on the draft amendment and its actual content. We have received positive feedback on the general plan for the use and allocation of HPRP funds in the County.

2. Briefly describe the process(es) indicated in question 1 above (limit 250 words).

Response: Anne Arundel County is in the process of developing a comprehensive homeless prevention, shelter diversion and rapid re-housing program. The program will involve hiring a central intake coordinator for initial participant assessment and qualification. The central intake case coordinator will then refer participants to designated homeless providers who will work with each participant to either prevent them from becoming homeless or link them to housing and appropriate services. As the County's Department of Social Services serves as a central entry into the homeless continuum of care system, it will also serve as the central intake for the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP). Therefore, the County will award HPRP Program funding to the County's Department of Social Services to pay for the coordinator position.

The County will use a competitive request for proposals (RFP) which clearly outlines the scope of services and program parameters to select service providers to provide case management and financial assistance to rapidly re-house participants or prevent evictions. Given the extensive regulatory requirements, the County is limiting applicants to those who have experience operating federally funded projects and programs.

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3. Briefly describe the process the grantee plans to use, once HUD signs the grant agreement, to allocate funds available to subgrantees by September 30, 2009, as required by the HPRP Notice (limit 250 words).

Response: ACDS has been developing a strategy for the use of HPRP funds since January 2009 including meeting with stakeholders and homeless providers and researching national best practices. Based on these discussions and research, ACDS expects to develop a comprehensive strategy for the best and most financially efficient use of the HPRP funds. ACDS has established the following time line to ensure that the September 30, 2009 deadline is met.

- Strategy and program parameters for the use of HPRP funds finalized – May 29, 2009.
 - Request for Proposal (RFP) made available to public – June 19, 2009.
 - RFPs due to ACDS by 4:00 pm, Friday, July 17, 2009.
 - Grant announcements for subrecipient awards will be made by August 14, 2009.
 - Initial grant and program orientation for subrecipients will be held by August 28, 2009.
 - Grant agreements completed and signed by subrecipients no later than September 18, 2009.
4. Describe the grantee’s plan for ensuring the effective and timely use of HPRP grant funds on eligible activities, as outlined in the HPRP Notice. Include a description of how the grantee plans to oversee and monitor the administration and use of its own HPRP funds, as well as those used by its subgrantees (limit 500 words).

Response: ACDS, a nonprofit organization, is currently under contract with Anne Arundel County, Maryland to administer federal HUD funds, including HOME, CDBG, ESG, HOPWA, and SHP. ACDS is responsible for ensuring monitoring and regulatory compliance for each of the federal grants it administers.

ACDS, on behalf of the County, plans to oversee and monitor the administration and use of HPRP funds by following the County’s Monitoring Plan as outlined in the Anne Arundel County Consolidated Plan FY 2006 – FY 2010 including providing orientation, training and technical assistance, executing binding grant agreements, overseeing financial and program record management, and on-site comprehensive monitoring. ACDS staff will meet with all new subrecipients to review federal program requirements to ensure that each subrecipient understands the importance of compliance with these requirements. Training and technical assistance will continue during the development of grant agreements for approved activities and throughout project implementation and close out. Subrecipients will be trained to verify participant eligibility including determining income and certifying homelessness, to understand rent reasonableness, Homeless Management

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Information System (HMIS) requirements, lead paint and housing quality standards (HQS), and other program requirements. Once a grant agreement is executed, ACDS will review invoices and performance reports, including HMIS data, on a monthly basis. Program management also involves the recording and tracking of each activity through all financial transactions to close out. The tracking system also includes maintaining required beneficiary data.

On-site monitoring of all subrecipients of HPRP funds will be conducted annually. The regulations governing the use of federal funds state that the primary goal of monitoring is to make sure that subrecipients are complying with all regulations governing their administrative, financial and programmatic operations, and to ensure they achieve their performance objectives within schedule and budget. This ensures that subrecipients are complying with all stipulations as outlined in grant agreements, scope of services, budgets, and appendices to the grant agreement.

Given the nature of this project, it is anticipated that subrecipients will also be asked to meet on a monthly basis to discuss program issues, trouble shoot, and provide a means of ongoing program evaluation.

D. Collaboration

1. Briefly describe how the grantee plans to collaborate with the local agencies that can serve similar target populations, which received funds under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 from other Federal agencies, including the U.S. Departments of Education, Health and Human Services, Homeland Security, and Labor (limit 250 words).

Response: ACDS has been working with the local Department of Social Services - which receives funds through Health and Human Services and is the administrator of the local FEMA Board - and the local Workforce Development Corporation to ensure that the target population for HPRP funds can access coordinated mainstream and workforce development resources. Both of these agencies will play a critical role in the success of the program. The program design for the County's HPRP Program will use the Department of Social Services as a centralized intake process to screen clients for program eligibility and link them with community providers who will provide housing placement, support, and case management or assist them to stabilize their housing. The Coordinator located at the Department of Social Services will work to link participants to Workforce Development for employment assistance.

ACDS is also working with Anne Arundel County Public Schools which has a homeless liaison who is a member of the County's Homeless Partnership (Anne Arundel County's Continuum of Care). The Homeless Liaison has first hand knowledge of the families whom are both at risk of becoming homeless and/or doubled up with family and friends and could benefit from the HPRP Program. The Homeless Liaison will play a key role in marketing the program to these

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families. ACDS has also met with the County's Community Action Agency, which is receiving stimulus funds through the Community Services Block Grant, to collaborate and ensure that these funds can enhance opportunities for low income citizens. It is anticipated that the County's Community Action Agency will receive a significant increase in utility funds and that these funds can further supplement the HPRP program resources.

Additionally, the Office of the County Executive has organized several meetings among County agencies and departments to help coordinate the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 funds.

2. Briefly describe how the grantee plans to collaborate with appropriate Continuum(s) of Care and mainstream resources regarding HPRP activities (limit 250 words).

Response: ACDS is a nonprofit organization under contract with Anne Arundel County to manage the homeless Continuum of Care planning process. This involves the application and administration of the Supportive Housing Program, ESG, and managing the coordination and facilitation of the Anne Arundel and Annapolis Partnership to End Homelessness (Homeless Partnership) - the County's Continuum of Care Planning Group - which is responsible for overall planning, policy, and program development. ACDS, in conjunction with support from the County's Department of Social Services, and members of the Partnership's executive committee is responsible for setting policy, strategic planning, and developing new programs.

The Homeless Partnership includes representatives from (i) State, County, and the City of Annapolis agencies administering mainstream resources, (ii) shelter and nonprofit service providers, (iii) the FEMA Board, (iv) organizations serving individuals diagnosed with HIV/AIDS, and (v) formerly homeless persons, advocates, and others with roles, interests and responsibilities in addressing issues associated with homelessness in the County.

Since the announcement of the Stimulus Package in February 2009, the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program has been an agenda topic of all Homeless Partnership meetings. Additionally, the Partnership has held several subcommittee meetings to discuss the current needs of the homeless, identify target populations, and potential uses of the funds. The Homeless Partnership helped to establish the County's strategy for the use of HPRP funds. It is expected that all of the applicants for HPRP program funds will be members of the Homeless Partnership. ACDS will continue to use the Homeless Partnership as the vehicle for obtaining input and support for the HPRP Program throughout the term of the grant.

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3. Briefly describe how HPRP grant funds for financial assistance and housing relocation/stabilization services will be used in a manner that is consistent with the grantee's Consolidated Plan (limit 250 words).

Response: HPRP funds for financial assistance and housing relocation/stabilization services is consistent with Anne Arundel County's Consolidated Plan FY 2006-FY2010. The Plan's primary goal to address homelessness is to:

“work toward ending and preventing homelessness by (i) increasing the supply of affordable permanent housing with supportive services; (ii) preventing families and individuals from becoming homeless; (iii) ensuring adequate interim or short term housing options; and (iv) providing comprehensive essential services to support efforts to transition quickly from interim or short term housing to permanent housing as well as maintain permanent housing placement.”

Further, the Plan outlines two strategies that are consistent with the overall objective of HPRP. The first strategy is to “provide emergency financial assistance and counseling to households who are at risk or in danger of being evicted from their rental units” and the second strategy is to “assist homeless people, including chronically homeless, obtain permanent affordable housing with accompanying supportive services.”

Based on the overall goal and strategies outlined above, it is clear that the intended use of HPRP funds is consistent with Anne Arundel County's Consolidated Plan.

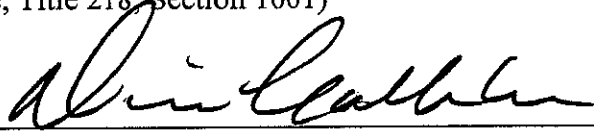

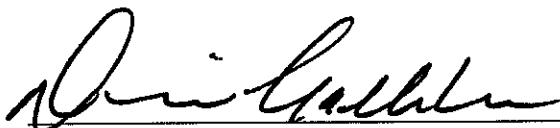

GENERAL CERTIFICATIONS FOR STATE OR LOCAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION AND RAPID RE-HOUSING PROGRAM (HPRP)

In accordance with the applicable statutes and the regulations governing the consolidated plan regulations, the state, territory, or local government certifies that:

Affirmatively Further Fair Housing -- The state, territory, or local government will affirmatively further fair housing, which means it will conduct an analysis of impediments to fair housing choice within the jurisdiction or state, take appropriate actions to overcome the effects of any impediments identified through that analysis, and maintain records reflecting that analysis and actions in this regard.

Drug-Free Workplace -- It will or will continue to provide a drug-free workplace by:

1. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the grantee's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
2. Establishing an ongoing drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - (a) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - (b) The grantee's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - (c) Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
 - (d) The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
3. Making it a requirement that each employee to be engaged in the performance of the grant be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph 1;
4. Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph 1 that, as a condition of employment under the grant, the employee will -
 - (a) Abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (b) Notify the employer in writing of his or her conviction for a violation of a criminal drug statute occurring in the workplace no later than five calendar days after such conviction;
5. Notifying the agency in writing, within ten calendar days after receiving notice under subparagraph 4(b) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to every grant officer or other designee on whose grant activity the convicted employee was working, unless the Federal agency has designated a central point for the receipt of such notices. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected grant;
6. Taking one of the following actions, within 30 calendar days of receiving notice under subparagraph 4(b), with respect to any employee who is so convicted -
 - (a) Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination, consistent with the requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or

- (b) Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, state, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency;
7. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Anti-Lobbying -- To the best of the state, territory, or local government's knowledge and belief:

1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;
2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and
3. INSTRUCTIONS CONCERNING LOBBYING AND DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE REQUIREMENTS:

A. Lobbying Certification

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code.
